Sara received a Ph.D. in Classics from the University of Florida, with a dissertation project on ancient medicine in May 2016. During the 2016/2017 academic year, she taught for both the Classics and the Languages, Literatures and Cultures Departments at UF.

In Fall 2017, Sara joined the One Health Center of Excellence, a multidisciplinary center that promotes and facilitates the implementation of the One Health vision. Some of her responsibilities are developing and promoting different narrative formats –through the languages of art, music and literature– to communicate science to a lay audience, investigating historical perspectives on health and disease, and teaching interdisciplinary courses that forge connections between the humanities and the biosciences. She is also program coordinator of the S.H.E Talks - Sharing Human Experiences initiative at UF.

Anthony is a broadly-tuned organismal biologist with a special interest in the behavior, physiology, and evolution of arthropods (especially the Arachnida), as well as science education and communication. As a lecturer in the Entomology & Nematology Department, Anthony seeks to share his passion for arthropods with students from all backgrounds, with the hope of fostering a lifelong appreciation for these fascinating animals. One of his primary duties is the development and coordination of CUREs (Course-based Undergraduate Research Experiences) in entomology, which aim to provide students with a meaningful introduction to conducting real entomological research in a collaborative setting. He is also involved with undergraduate advising in the department, and enjoys helping students discover their interests and work towards their career goals.

REBECCA BALDWIN

Dr. Rebecca Baldwin received her BS and MS degrees from the University of Louisiana Monroe and her PhD from the University of Florida. She is currently an associate professor and the undergraduate coordinator for the University of Florida Entomology and Nematology Department. She became interested in entomology as a child through the 4-H club in Ouachita Parish, and shares her love of entomology and education by directing the UF Entomology Education and Outreach Program, by mentoring and advising students, and by teaching general education and introductory entomology courses to undergraduates. Her research program focuses on Integrated Pest Management (IPM) tools for crawling insects. Outside of the classroom, Rebecca provides CEU and recertification training for teachers as well as many local, state and national pest management agencies, pest management associations, and for the Entomological Society of America (ESA) Associate Certified Entomologist (ACE) program.

- **o** To bring an entomological view of how global human cultures and societies, including art, food, literature, laws and music, are influenced by insects.
- **o** To introduce students in general education courses to the, often neglected, global diseases transmitted by arthropods.
- o To provide students with case studies and interviews that bring an international perspective. Students would formulate local applications from this global perspective of arthropods.



ERIKA BROOKE

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Erika J. Brooke, PhD, is a Lecturer in Criminology in the Department of Sociology and Criminology & Law at the University of Florida. Her research interests revolve around the courts to corrections pipeline with special emphasis on the military service and crime relationship, problem solving courts, substance use and abuse and program evaluation. Dr. Brooke teaches a variety of undergraduate courses in Criminology. She is known for incorporating experiential learning opportunities within each of her courses that give students on-hand experience exploring the criminal justice system. Dr. Brooke is currently a co-faculty advisor of the Criminology and Law Honor Society at the University of Florida. She also balances her academic profession along with a career in the U.S. Army Reserve that has now spanned over 13 years.

- **o** Internationalize Careers in Criminal Justice by incorporating a global perspective into the course, aligning with the Beyond120 initiative
- **o** Improve the marketability of students by teaching them how to communicate and interact with individuals from different cultures in a meaningful way
- Learn tools and techniques to internationalize online courses and campus organizations like the Criminology & Law Honor Society (which also has UFO members)
- **o** Extend the international influence beyond the Gainesville area using active learning assignments focused on internationalization or global perspectives

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Susan Curry is a Senior Lecturer and Undergraduate Coordinator for the Interdisciplinary Studies – Environmental Management in Agriculture and Natural Resources major in the Soil and Water Sciences Department. She has been teaching and advising for the past 11 years. Susan teaches Agriculture and Environmental Quality, Soil and Water Conservation and Geographic Information Systems. She also team advises over 120 students.

As Undergraduate Coordinator, she was instrumental in the development of the IS-EMANR degree as a 2+2 program and its adoption into UF Online. It is currently ranked as the #1 online Environmental Science program in the nation by BestColleges.com. Susan is one of the mentors for the experiential learning component (internships and individual projects) which must be completed by our students.

She received her ME in Environmental Engineering and BS in Agricultural Engineering from UF. She was involved in research and education programs dealing with climate change, energy production from waste, and nutrient management.

- o To help students learn about the role of culture in solving problems in international contexts
- To enhance the course through experiential learning activities (i.e., by interviewing international experts or collaborating with students in other countries)

She received a Master of Public Health at the University of Florida in 2017. She also worked as an adjunct professor at Santa Fe College in 2018 and as a freelance medical writer since 2016. She is currently developing several One Health courses to be taught at the University of Florida in the 2020-2021 school year.

She completed her PhD in Biology at the University of Iowa in 2015 and worked with BioQUEST Curriculum Consortium on the Quantitative Undergraduate Biology Education and Synthesis project as a postdoctoral scholar before moving to Florida in 2018 to complete a postdoctoral fellow position with UF's Department of Geography and the CDC Southeast Center of Excellence in Vector Borne Disease. Her academic interests include ecological modeling of host-parasite interactions to understand the spread of disease, and discipline based education research. Her spare time is spent traveling, entertaining her three pets, and spending time with her family.

- **o** Develop and internationalize introductory medical geography course, The Next Pandemic, focusing on disease outbreaks that have shaped human society and their biological/social/political/economic implications.
- **o** Learn tools and techniques to expose students to ideas, experiences, and concepts from outside their culture and think critically in the classroom
- **o** Learn about campus resources to be a more efficient and effective instructor, and connect with faculty about approaches to challenging conversations in the classroom, their experiences, etc.

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Harrison Hove is a Lecturer in the College of Journalism and Communications at the University of Florida. Hove teaches courses on television news reporting, investigative reporting, broadcast writing, and performance. He also produces large scale projects with student journalists for WUFT-TV, a PBS affiliate. Those projects including, "Silenced: 1.5 million Florida felons without a vote" and "Locked Out: Florida sentences are for life," and earned regional Edward R. Murrow Awards. Projects he has overseen have earned recognition from RTDNA, SPJ, AP, BEA, and the Heart Journalism Awards. Before arriving at the University of Florida in 2017, Hove worked for local television news stations in Florida, Louisiana, and Ohio where he served in roles as news anchor, reporter, and meteorologist. Hove has earned 7 regional Emmys and 21 nominations for his work.

- **o** Improve marketability of students by introducing them to concepts and methods of world language education outside the US context
- **o** Learn about tools and resources that will introduce new ways to internationalize courses and to create new materials (including videos, interviews, etc.) for the Spanish for Educators course
- Allow students to investigate education beyond their own experiences and analyze education as a set of products, practices, and perspectives as global citizens

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Before joining UF, Carly spent 9 years teaching ESL in higher education and discovered a passion for and research interest in composition pedagogy, education technology, and instructional design.




